Yet now, there are many artists you will no longer see in OUR MOB exhibitions as their art practices have expanded and succeeded to such an extent that they are highly sought after across Australia and the globe.

It is by working together as a team that OUR MOB has achieved fantastic outcomes for Aboriginal artists in SA.



Ananguku Arts and Culture Aboriginal Corporation and the SICAD program have been in partnership with the Adelaide Festival Centre and the OUR MOB project since its inception in 2006. They also the proud sponsor of the annual Our Young Mob award. The Statewide Indigenous Community Artists Development (SICAD) program strives for arts outcomes that are culturally positive and of benefit to wider regional communities by supporting Aboriginal leadership, project ownership and community wellbeing through the arts. This year Ananguku Arts has delivered a range of workshops and events to the professional development of individual artists and arts projects in regional and remote South Australia, with much of the artwork produced submitted and featured in the OUR MOB exhibition.

Successful acrylic on canvas programs were continued in Coober Pedy, along with further punu (woodcarving) workshops conducted in Port Augusta. An outstanding workshop was run in Oak Valley, boosting the number of artists who submitted paintings from this region. A glass workshop introduced artists into this exciting medium, as well as building on skills and technique some artists

had previously established. Artists attended from Port Augusta, Whyalla, Berri, Mt Gambier and Adelaide and was an unqualified success. This year also saw artists from Port Pirie and the surrounding area attend a watercolour and charcoal workshop by the extremely talented artist Damien Shen. Ananguku Arts also provide recruitment support, human resource management, training and employment in the arts, advocacy and marketing for Aboriginal artists and art centres across the state, playing an active and pivotal role in the promotion of OUR MOB and assisting artists to contribute artworks for the exhibition



JOSINA NYARPINGKA PUMANI: MY FAMILY MY COUNTRY A SERIES OF DIGITAL IMAGES

Josina was the 2015 winner of the *Don Dunstan Foundation OUR MOB Emerging Artist Prize*. As the winner of this monetary prize, she is also invited to present an exhibition of her work in the Festival Theatre Foyer as part of the OUR MOB 2016 program.

Josina is a young Pitjantjatjara/Yankunytjatjara woman who was born in Mimili in the APY Lands in far north South Australia. Her mother is Ngupulya Pumani and her father is Shannon Kantji. Josina began painting in 2009 and she is one of the youngest members of Mimili Maku Arts. Her mother Ngupulya and grandmother Kunmanara (Milatjari) Pumani (deceased) have strong cultural connections to the land and are also established and highly sought after artists from Mimili Maku Arts. Josina has learnt a great deal from them.

Josina is also an arts worker at Mimili Maku Arts and through this role has been developing a new arts practice in photography and digital media. Already an accomplished painter, Josina has recently been combining her painting practice with new techniques of photography and digital media, exploring her strongly felt connection between family and country. After setting up a photography studio in a storeroom at Mimili Maku Arts with another artist, Josina produced some high quality portraits of her family in a studio setting. She has then incorporated these portraits into digital images within insightful photographs of her country.

OUR MOB CONTEMPORARY: IN OUR HANDS

Curated by Robert Fielding with Coby Edgar

Through projects initiated by DesArt I have had the pleasure to work with Robert Fielding on several occasions. My first stint with him was for the DesArt Photography Art Prize professional development in curatorial and installation practice in 2014. His visual arts practice at that point was very much photo documentary and acrylic paintings. During the professional development week it became very clear to me that Robert was an eloquent man with a deep understanding of the complexities of visual language.

When I next met him, in 2015, he had undertaken a Cicada Press workshop in printmaking facilitated by DesArt and had expanded his photographic practice to portraiture as well as continuing his documentary photography and experimenting with layering different mediums. His work was becoming more conceptual and his visual language in the photographic medium was becoming a main strength in his practice.

That year he won the work on paper category at the Telstra National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art Awards with his work *Milkali Kutju*, translated from Pitjantjatjara language to *One Blood*, for me this work became the start of an artistic fire that has exploded within Robert.

Almost three years on, several awards and series of works later Robert has not only kept up the energy in his practice but has become a leader in the innovation of photography and now film, as a medium in the rural arts arena

This project is an ode to our professional relationship, solidifying and expanding on the knowledges shared. This is the first solo exhibition in the OUR MOB Contemporary series, the most conceptual and in my opinion the most visually strong work that Robert has made to date. It is only with the support of DesArt, Mimili Maku Arts and Adelaide Festival Centre that this opportunity has been afforded to Robert and I to work together. I look forward to continuing to see his work evolve follow the trajectory of his practice as an artist, curator, writer and leader in the Aboriginal arts world.

Photography has been a small but commendable component of each annual OUR MOB exhibition. The genre demonstrates artists' recognition that photography can be a succinct way to capture their stories of country and life. Artists have been assisted with various regional photography based workshops which include use of Photoshop and Light 'painting' with photography. OUR MOB 2016 demonstrates the growing trend for artists to both capture the moment or use digital programs to introduce rich layers of meaning into their photographic images.

Reg Dodd, an Arabunna elder, astute leader in Aboriginal affairs, cultural history, current events and a keen photographer has said: 'Tourists come through this place and say that there's nothing to see out there. They say it's a big country with nothing in it. But I can go out and photograph any number of things just in a tiny area. I take photographs of things in their natural habitat. Nearly all my photos are of this area because I can identify with the places and the images: they're part of me. The photos explain what I know about the place, share my experience.'




