



Equity Tickets

Just imagine the first professional performance you see being Disney's *Frozen The Musical!*

The Foundation proudly supports equitable access and tickets to our performances and festivals. Just one of those opportunities occurred when 190 high school students from six northern suburbs schools came to a special performance of *Frozen*, which also included a Q&A with cast and technical crew, at the Festival Theatre.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the day with one student from Para Hills High School exclaiming "It's amazing, it was absolutely incredible... wow just wow!"

Dance Workshop

During OzAsia Festival more than 600 students from six schools took part in a classical Chinese dance workshop.

Reception to Year 2 students from Lockleys Primary School, Goodwood Primary School, Ingle Farm Primary School, Darlington Primary School, Burton Primary School, and Ocean View College learnt a classic Chinese dance with elements from the Tang and Han Dynasties, and also explored costumes and accessories associated with Chinese classical dance.

Under 30 Tickets

Adelaide Cabaret Festival, with the support of the Nunn Dimos Foundation, provided access to over 350 low-cost tickets for those aged 30 and under. A hugely important initiative to ensure access to the arts and engage the next generation of arts lovers.



Songlines

The Foundation, in conjunction with the James and Diana Ramsay Foundation, assisted 'Songlines' – a program inspired by the First Nations practice of sharing knowledge amongst communities and Countries.

Now in its second successful year, led by Barkindji singer-songwriter Nancy Bates and Katie Aspel, a Ngarrindjeri artist from Raukkan, students participated in robust discussions about Reconciliation - what it means to them, why it's important and how we can work to achieve it.

The students' words were then woven into their own unique contemporary songline. The classes came together at the end of the day to perform and record their song. These schools now have their own Reconciliation song that they can be proud of and use as a reminder of the importance of Reconciliation and the actions they can take to achieve it.

On Stage

The On Stage team ran a musical theatre intensive program, designed to develop participants' triple threat skills and help them experience the musical theatre genre. Participants learnt a range of vocal activities, acting techniques, and movement exercises. Participants also had the opportunity to practice and perform many popular show tunes. Improv theatre workshops were also a part of the program focusing on character development and improvisation.

Thanks to the supporters of the Artistic Director's Fund a limited number of scholarship opportunities were provided to young people who would not normally have the opportunity to participate in arts learning.

In March, Adelaide Festival Centre celebrated the opening of Children's Artspace, a dedicated space at Adelaide Festival Centre for children of all ages to share big ideas and engage with art created by and for South Australian children. Donors to the project and guests enjoyed a wonderful morning exploring the first exhibition *Kaleidoscope:* Playing with Colour.

Children's Artspace in Action

Children's Artspace has already seen four fabulous exhibitions. Exhibitions are led by workshops in schools with local artists, who have been specially selected and are graduates from Adelaide Central School of Art.

The first exhibition, Kaleidoscope: Plauing with Colour, was created by students from Keller Road Primary School and Hackham West School, with the mentorship of South Australian artist Ruby Chew.

The second exhibition delivered a contrasting set of visually stunning pieces from Salisbury East High School and Craigmore High School students. Led by artist Caitlin Bowe, students created demons, gods, heroes and mythical creatures that featured in tales from their cultural backgrounds.

The participating students were invited to Adelaide Festival Centre to see their own stories exhibited in Children's Artspace, and for 99% of those 12 and 13-year-old students, it was their first time stepping foot in Adelaide Festival Centre.

"These schools have limited access to arts education opportunities - with most primary schools we work with not having an arts specialist. We know that engagement in the arts encourages social cohesion and connection. We see this firsthand with projects like Legendary Textile Tales - in schools where cultural rifts can lead to challenging environments, projects like these give opportunities to understand each other a little better. We focus on partnering with passionate educators in these 'Equity schools' – we know that our programs can truly change lives, make students feel validated, seen and connected." 

The Frank Ford Commissioning Award provides funding towards the commissioning of new South Australian cabaret works to be performed by local artists at Adelaide Cabaret Festival.

The 2022 Frank Ford Commissioning Award was granted to Victoria Falconer for her creation of *And Then You Go* – *The Vali Myers Project*. Victoria became fascinated with the Australian artist Vali Myers and created an ensemble cast of multi-disciplinary performers using dance, puppetry, song, circus and a rich array of instruments in this celebration of a life lived without compromise.





Adelaide International Classical Guitar Competition
