Professional Learning workshops that support state-wide projects and <u>DreamBIG Children's Festival</u> are again being offered by the Department for Education of South Australia.

DreamBIG Children's Festival 2021 was launched for South Australian schools in September 2020, when the DreamBIG Children's Festival <u>Schools' Program</u> and accompanying Department's <u>Teaching and Learning Resource</u> were distributed to all schools in SA.

The workshops are:

- Suitable for teachers, whether an arts specialist or non-specialist, of primary, special needs and secondary students.
- Practical in nature and are designed to provide quick training.
- Aligned with the Australian Curriculum: The Arts and intended to support students'
 participation in the Festival, either through attending a performance or celebrating the arts
 within their school community.
- Free for government school teachers, with costs being met by Corporate Office.

Professional Learning workshops on offer are:

- 1. Curiosity box / Space-iosity drama
- 2. Chroma key critters: Animation and screen trickery media arts
- 3. **Dancing our landscape** dance, with a little HASS!

Chroma key critters: Animation and screen trickery

Big Screens Little Artists (Yrs 3-12)

Find out how to get the most out of the DreamBIG Children's Festival *Big Screens Little Artists* state-wide project with professional animator Luku Kukuku.

Learn from an expert about how to create digital artworks using Flipaclip, Tagtool, and Stop Motion Studio in this practical, hands-one workshop. Return to your class to share your new skills with the students!

Have your students create digital artworks on the festival theme to send into DreamBIG. Artworks will be displayed on the outdoor digital screens at Adelaide Festival Centre.

Improve students' learning outcomes both *in* and *through* The Arts. Apply Critical and creative thinking processes as you are guided through the ways that the codes and conventions (ie elements of media arts – representation, story principles) can be used while working from the Australian Curriculum: The Arts – Media Arts.

Refer to the <u>DreamBIG Teaching and Learning Resource 2021</u> Media Arts: No Green Bears Please! Pp33–36 and Statewide Projects on p52, and <u>DreamBIG School's Program 2021</u> p42.

What to bring?

- Some experience required.
- BYO *fully charged* device (smartphone or table iPad is preferred), with the following apps downloaded *before attending the workshop*.
 - FlipaClip: Cartoon Animation (iPad) (Android)
 - Autodesk Sketchbook (iPad) (Android)
 - Stop Motion Studio: Let's Make a Movie (iPad) (Android)
 - Tagtool (iPad only)

(The paid versions of both apps are quite useful as they have more features, but the free versions are also sufficient for some great outcomes.)

- A stylus is optional, but useful.

- Internet use is limited. Please be advised to perhaps hotspot your phone or BYO Wi-Fi access device.





Curiosity Box and Space-iosity

"While 'drama' may conjure up thoughts of the school play or a recent outing to the theatre, drama in school is a different beast. It is an educational undertaking designed for the benefit of the participants rather than for the purpose of entertaining an audience. The scripted play still has its place, but the real focus is on the drama that emerges from children's imagination." (Booth, 2005)

Through this practical, hands-on workshop, find out how you can support students' learning and engagement through process drama activities.

Improve students' learning outcomes both *in* and *through* The Arts. Apply Critical and Creative Thinking processes; promote Intercultural Understanding and find some engaging ways to the Crosscurriculum priorities, particularly First Nation perspectives.

Working from the Australian Curriculum: The Arts – Drama, be guided through the ways that the elements of drama (eg role, character, voice, movement, space and language) from the Examples of knowledge and skills and Responding and viewpoints can be used to enhance students' understanding in other Learning Areas.

What to bring?

No previous experience required; wear comfortable clothing.

Dancing Our Landscape (including the online version; adapted as necessary).

Suitable for all primary teachers; no dance experience necessary.

How can students draw upon the history and features of a 'place' to communicate meaning and intent through choreography and performance?

This practical workshop will guide participants through a range of making and responding activities working from the Australian Curriculum-Dance, exploring gestural movement and choreographic tools to embody place and sequence a site-specific dance.

Explore how a focus of place and space can engage learners in critical and creative thinking and connect to the cross-curriculum priority, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Culture.

Kerrin Rowlands is a lecturer in Arts Education at the University of South Australia. She has taught extensively in schools, universities and arts education organisations. She works with government and education departments as a professional learning program coordinator in arts education and as a Teaching Artist in dance and Creative Body-based Learning (CBL). She is the program development manager for the Developing Effective Arts Learning (DEAL) program for Carclew (DfE). Kerrin's research focuses on the enactment of dance in the school curriculum and Creative and Body-based

Learning pedagogies. Her current PhD research investigates how teachers prioritise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander content in the new Australian dance curriculum.

Luku is South Australia's favourite multidisciplinary multimedia merrymaker, constantly creating colourful content & vivid visual voyages.

Making work which transcends the limitations of the screen is Luku's forte. Built on top of an artistic career steeped in distinctive daubist paintings, Luku's fascination for the digital has since manifested large

scale mapped projections, animations, motion graphics, sound responsive light shows, motion controlled interactive spectacles and more - all topped with a healthy dollop of magical multicoloured madness.

Luku has conducted artist residencies in schools over many years and is skilled in working with students and teachers alike, inspiring their curiosity and creativity.

Since 2017, Luku has been curating and creating digital artworks at the d'Arenberg Cube, including the immersive 360 degree alternate reality experience. Luku has also been a prolific collaborator in South Australian children's theatre, contributing lighting trickery for Patch and Slingsby, and previously worked as the lead animator and interactive multimedia creative at Illuminart.
